## We Support State Leaders Prioritizing Child Care in the 89th Legislative Session

High-quality child care enables parents to work and provide their children with opportunities to learn, socialize, and build new skills during the critical age for brain development.

Unfortunately, Texas is experiencing a child care crisis, and many working families are unable to find and afford the high-quality care they need. This crisis is:

- A challenge for children's future success in school: Many children end up in lower quality programs during the critical early years of brain development.
- A challenge for working families: Parents often have very few choices for high-quality care—and the available options pose a huge and often untenable financial burden.
- A challenge for child care programs: Because of a lack of funding, programs struggle to recruit and retain staff and serve parents in need.
- A challenge for businesses in all sectors of the Texas economy: Texas businesses rely on high-quality child care to recruit and retain an effective and reliable workforce.

To ensure that Texas parents have access to high-quality child care, we recommend the following:

1.	providers who serve them.
	<ul> <li>Address the long waitlist (about 78,000 children in fiscal year 2024) by funding more scholarships for eligible families.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Ensure reimbursement rates to CCS programs are at the state's established</li> </ul>
	reimbursement rate for the provider's quality and not limited by published tuition costs.
2.	Build up the supply of child care programs that meet urgent needs.
	<ul> <li>Provide competitive grants through a pilot program that empowers communities to expand affordable care in high-need areas, (e.g., infant &amp; toddler care, alternative hour care, care for children with disabilities, child care deserts, proximity to major employers).</li> <li>Address unintended zoning barriers to expand the supply of licensed child care homes.</li> </ul>
3.	Ensure programs can recruit and retain qualified and effective staff.

4.	Increase access to public pre-k by expanding opportunities for partnerships with community-based child care settings.
